Reaching the Target?

An HIV/AIDS Information Needs Assessment

The HIVAIDS News Service





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Executive summary

This Information Needs Assessment explores how HIV and AIDS information is used by key stakeholders on the ground in five countries in Southern Africa – Malawi, Mozambique, Swaziland, Zambia and Zimbabwe.

What sort of information is required by the actors? How is it accessed? Who does it benefit? What are the common shortcomings? The assessment explores how information flows can be strengthened, and evidence-based policies, programmes and decisions can be reinforced. "The AIDS battle needs to begin with information."

Summary of key findings

There is a clear need for more **AIDS information**, **education and communication (IEC) at local and country levels**. Information should be produced in local languages, be culturally appropriate, easy to understand and relevant to people on the ground; it should target women, youth and children, and be made available to rural as well as urban communities.

Strategic Information (on scientific, policy and programmatic responses to the epidemic) needs to be packaged so that it is easy to understand and can be applied by all employees and volunteers in organisations. Strategic information should be evidenced-based, consistent and more country-specific.

Capacity strengthening is needed across organisations. Information and communications technology (ICT) training is particularly important, as most organisations have access to ICT but lack the necessary skills to use it optimally to inform their work. Skills in understanding and translating epidemiological and statistical data also need to be improved.

There is a general need to strengthen the ability to **produce user-friendly information material** for wider dissemination.

Information flow and management need to be better **coordinated**, preferably by setting up a central distribution body responsible for coordinating and systematically disseminating HIV and AIDS information in each country.

There is a need for improved **marketing** by existing information providers. Many organisations have little knowledge of the wide range of information services available. Others, even if they are aware of these sources, do not seem to access them regularly, mainly because they lack the necessary ICT skills.

1. Introduction

The information needs assessment was commissioned by IRIN/Plus*News* and conducted from March to May 2006 in five countries in Southern Africa: Zambia, Zimbabwe, Malawi, Mozambique and Swaziland.

2. Methodology

2.1 Goals and Objectives

The overall goal of this study is to map the information needs of, and delivery channels to, local AIDS Service Organisations (ASOS), People Living with HIV and AIDS (PLWHA) organisations and government agencies in the five countries. The needs assessment aims to improve the development, targeting and delivery of information produced by HIV and AIDS information providers.

The objectives of the Information Needs Assessment are to:

- Identify and evaluate sources of information on HIV and AIDS in terms of relevance, suitability and comprehension for ASOs, PLWHAs and government agencies;
- Identify gaps in the available information accessed by ASOs and PLWHAs and government agencies;
- Identify information and communication channels that can be utilised to increase the flow of information on HIV and AIDS
- Serve to connect ASOs, PLWHAs and government agencies to HIV and AIDS information networks at national and regional level.

2.2 Study design

A standardised questionnaire, developed by the team leader, was administered by the national consultants during individual in-depth interviews with senior staff/officials of the sampled organisations selected in each country.

Sample

A purposive sample (i.e. a selection of organisations from the spectrum one is interested in) was drawn from each of the following categories of organisations:

- Organisations of people living with HIV and AIDS (PLWHAs)
- AIDS Services Organisations (ASOs)
- Government departments and institutions working in the area of HIV and AIDS

A total of 192 organisations representing the above categories constituted the sample. Due to resource constraints the sample was selected from organisations operating from no more than two main cities in the country, with the exception of Mozambique and Zambia:

Malawi: Lilongwe and Blantyre Swaziland: Manzini and Mbabane Zimbabwe: Harare and Bulawayo Zambia: Lusaka Mozambigue: Samples were selected from the southern, central and northern regions.

The sample included organisations such as HIV and AIDS network organisations and institutions with a broader reach through satellite offices or affiliated organisations in various provinces or regions of each country. This assisted in gathering information from organisations working in parts of the country outside the specific geographical areas where the questionnaires were administered.

Data capturing and analysis

Capturing and analysis of data gathered from the questionnaires was done centrally under supervision of the team leader. Data were captured and analysed using SPSS version 14. Frequency analysis, cross-tabulations and thematic analysis of open-ended responses were performed, highlighting national and regional trends.

2.3 Limitations of the Study

- Financial resource available influenced the size and geographical spread of the sample. Mainly organisations based in urban areas were interviewed.
- Some respondents complained about the length of the questionnaire, but the response rate was high.
- Interviewers were not trained or thoroughly briefed in administering this particular questionnaire. This resulted in some loss of data.
- The sample is not statistically representative of the population (i.e. ASOs, organisations representing PLWHA and government). Although the findings are a

valid and reliable reflection of the issues investigated, generalisation beyond this sample should be done with discretion.

Having said this, the sample realisation and quality of data satisfy acceptable standards of descriptive studies of this nature conducted in this context. Findings can thus be accepted as valid and reliable.

2.4 Description of organisations sampled

A total of 192 organisations were interviewed across 5 countries: 15% of the total sample (29 organisations) were interviewed in Zimbabwe; 20% (39) in Swaziland; 26% (50) in Mozambique; 13% (24) in Malawi and 26% (50) in Zambia. Mostly senior people in the organisation (directors, managers) and middle management (co-ordinators) participated in the survey. In some cases people with a health/ HIV and AIDS portfolio were interviewed, as well as people with a research and information/ communication portfolio.

Types of organisations participating in the study

In all countries, most interviewees categorised their organisations as AIDS Service Organisations (ASOs) and NGOs (see chart for details). Other classifications mentioned but with percentages too low to be included in the chart were: Faith-based Organisations, Business, and Donor Agencies.

The total exceeds 100%, as the categories were not mutually exclusive; interviewees could mark more than one option.

Although only 18% of organisations described themselves as media producers, 59% indicated that they produced HIV and AIDS material for further distribution. In Zambia, this figure was as high as 74% and it remained above 50% in the other countries.

Geographical location of organisations

Just over 90% of the organisations interviewed were based in urban areas, but 48% had offices in more than one location. Of the total sample, 16% had offices in periurban areas and 16% had offices in rural districts. However, there were large variations across the five countries. Almost 1 in 3 organisations interviewed in Malawi and Zambia said they had offices in rural areas, compared to only 6% in Mozambique and Swaziland.

Scale of service delivery

Overall, 63% of respondents indicated that they worked in communities; 47% worked provincially or in different parts of the country; 53% worked nationally and 12% worked regionally. Again, there were significant country variations, with organisations in Malawi, Mozambique and Swaziland working more in communities than organisations in Zambia and Zimbabwe. In Zambia most organisations worked nationally (80%), and in Zimbabwe almost a third (31%) worked regionally.

Financial sustainability

A perhaps surprising 36% of the organisations said they could sustain themselves financially for 3 years or more: 26% for between 1 and 3 years; 23% for a year or less with their current funding. Organisations in Malawi and Zambia seemed to have a longer period of financial security than in other countries. At the other end of the spectrum, almost half (44%) the organisations in Swaziland had funding for one year or less.


Number of people employed

Across the five countries, 58% of organisations employed 20 people or less; a further 22% employed between 20 and 80 people. In Malawi and Mozambique, organisations tended to be larger than in other countries, and also tended to use more volunteers. Of the total sample, 76% reported that they used volunteers. Most organisations in Swaziland, Zambia and Zimbabwe used 10 volunteers or fewer, while most organisations in Malawi and Mozambique used more than 10.

How are PLWHA involved?

Service delivery: 66% Planning and development: 51% Management and decision-making: 40% Consultative capacity only: 39%

(The most notable variation from this pattern is Mozambique with 78% PLWHA reported to be involved in Planning and development and 61% in Management and decision-making)


3. Research Findings

Information usage and target audiences


HIV and AIDS information is highly valued by all organisations. More than 80% of respondents rated it as essential or very important to doing their work.

More than half the respondents (53%) said they sometimes specifically requested HIV and AIDS information, and 8% had actually paid for it. In Malawi this figure is as high as 21%.

Importance of HIV and AIDS Information in fulfilling organisational programmes and activities



Key people in organisations seem to have most access to HIV and AIDS information. Managers, co-ordinators, senior staff and programme staff top the list (78%), followed by directors (68%), administrative staff and volunteers (46%).



3.1 Usage of HIV and AIDS information

HIV and AIDS information is accessed for a variety of purposes (see chart) and there was some variation between countries on prioritising usage. For example, organisations in Mozambique and Zimbabwe seem to use HIV and AIDS for internal research purposes as well as fundraising more than the rest of the sample, but on the whole the regional pattern repeats itself at country level. Information is predominantly used for two main reasons, with two distinct target audiences, categorised as:

1. Strategic information used to keep informed on HIV and AIDS issues, and train staff and volunteers

Strategic information consists of epidemiological and statistical data, policies and guidelines. Target audiences consist mainly of staff and volunteers within and across organisations.

2. Information, Education, Communication (IEC) to inform and educate target audiences and disseminate to communities for educational, preventive and promotional purposes

IEC consists of a broad range of information and educational material intended for wider public dissemination. Target audience priorities identified by organisations are:

Different gaps and needs can be identified for both *form* and *content* of strategic information and IEC, just as disseminating IEC poses specific demands on the organisations, and these are treated separately below. However, organisations' capacity and needs in terms of accessing and engaging with information overlap for both types.

3.2 Receiving information

Face-to-face dissemination of HIV and AIDS information is the dominant mode of communication, followed by e-mail and Internet. Note that although email and the Internet are used more often than printed material, 16% of respondents across all countries never use information received via cyberspace.

The fact that a channel of communication is rarely or never used does not in itself indicate a gap or a need for more information via that channel. Asked directly about gaps in communication channels, the biggest need across all countries was for electronic media such as CDs, tapes and videos. A need for more print material (63%) and information via Internet (60%) followed.

Although there are specific needs and combinations of needs, such as an expressed need for receiving print material by post in Zimbabwe and a greater need for internet and e-mail information in Swaziland, the regional trend holds for countries.

Access to infrastructure resources

A total of 93% of organisations reported that they had computers in their offices; the remaining 7% said they could access a computer elsewhere. Overall, access to ICTs was extremely high: 90% had a telephone (landline) in the office (Malawi falling quite far below the average with only 71% access) and more than 4 out of 5 organisations had access not only to computers, but also to CD ROM, Internet and e-mail in their offices. Overall, 100% of the sample had access in some form to one or more computers; 95% had access to CD ROM; 97% to internet and 98% to e-mail; more than 70% use internet and email daily.

Internet connectivity among organisations was more or less evenly distributed between dial-up connections and permanent connections, with organisations in Mozambique reporting a remarkably better connectivity (70% access to permanent internet connection).

Mirroring the general trend that higher-level staff and management tend to access HIV and AIDS information more frequently (see page X), key staff and management inevitably also have better access to ICTs. For instance, almost 2 out of 3 programme staff members across the five countries have access to Internet and e-mail, as opposed to only 1 in 3 volunteers.

Preferred channels and vehicles of information

In all five countries the channels preferred by most respondents are electronic (internet and email) and print media.

The Internet – A trusted source of information

There is no substantive distinction in evaluation of the quality of HIV and AIDS information obtained electronically by e-mail or internet and from other sources: just 4% of respondents rated HIV and AIDS material currently received on e-mail or internet as poor or very poor; 5% rated material from other sources as poor/ very poor. For both electronic and other sources, 64% of respondents rated the material as good or excellent.

Internet

Respondents mentioned the internet as an excellent channel because it is relatively easy to use, cost-effective, fast and efficient, and easily available in the office; it is a good tool for researching issues important to the organisation, and helps update information on topical issues. Downloaded material is easy to distribute.

Awareness and usage of existing electronic sources of information

UNAIDS, followed by the Southern African AIDS Dissemination Service (SAFAIDS), IRIN and Plus*News*, were the best-known electronic sources of information. Besides the organisations in the chart, WHO, national AIDS councils, search engines (Google and Yahoo), UNICEF, PANOS, ministries of health, national networks of AIDS organisations and many other sources of information at national, regional and international levels were also mentioned, but less frequently.

E-mail

The reasons for using email as a preferred channel were very similar to those given for the internet. Respondents said the information obtained was easy to file and distribute internally and externally; it allows specific information to be requested from identified sources and is a highly interactive communication medium.

Electronic Networks

Across all countries 62% of respondents said their organisation belonged to networks that distribute HIV and AIDS information (62% in Zimbabwe; 26% in Swaziland; 74% in Mozambique; 83% in Malawi and 68% in Zambia). The networks most frequently mentioned were: national AIDS councils, networks of AIDS services organisations, SAfAIDS, the Zambia-based Afya Mzuri and the AfAIDS emailing list.

Print

Print was prominently mentioned as a channel for receiving and distributing HIV and AIDS information. Print material is easy to store and can be read at leisure; it can be photocopied and distributed to grassroots communities by post, hand delivery, or when attending workshops and conferences.

Radio and television

Both media reach large audiences and overcome problems of illiteracy. As a visual medium, TV was seen as having particular advantages.

Face to face communication, conferences and workshops

These were also mentioned as "good" channels for HIV and AIDS communication. The interactive manner in which information can be conveyed was considered the biggest advantage; it also allows for networking and establishing relations between organisations and individuals at the events.

Audiovisual materials, **audiotapes**, **CD** and **DVD** were mentioned less prominently as preferred information channels.

3.3 Disseminating information

Of the 59% of organisations in the five countries who said they produced HIV and AIDS material for distribution, 91% produced print material, 53% radio material and 40% television/video material. Theatre was the most frequently mentioned format in an open-ended option, with drama identified as a particularly good vehicle for IEC. Of the types of information produced, news was the most common category (75%), followed by documentaries (44%), talk shows (40%), magazine programmes (40%) and dramas/soap operas (38%).

Medium used by organisations producing HIV and AIDS information

Radio was regarded as the most popular medium, with 57% of respondents indicating that most of their target audience have access to a radio; followed by access to print media at 19% and television at 12%. Seven percent of the sample said most of their target audience have access to landlines; 9% mentioned cell phones and 5% the internet.

3.4 Organisational capacity to engage with, receive and disseminate information

Most respondents said their organisation's capacity to understand and use HIV and AIDS material was good (42%) or excellent (23%); 1 in 4 (26%) assessed their organisational capacity as "average" and less than 1 in 10 (8%) said it was poor or very poor. Furthermore, 80% of respondents said they knew people or organisations that could help them improve their capacity to engage with HIV and AIDS material. However, there are a number of areas that the organisations considered capacity gaps or shortcomings that could be improved upon.

Lack of capacity to produce media topped the list, followed by a lack of proficiency with internet and e-mail and the ability to understand technical information such as epidemiological data and statistics.

A critical point emerging from this section is that efforts should be focused on increasing *functional* access to computers and connectivity in the southern African region. The survey shows that all organisations interviewed have *actual* access to computers, and most (more than 9 out of 10) have access to the Internet and e-mail. However, organisations expressed a lack of capacity in using ICTs, hence the distinction between *functional* access and *actual* access. Therefore the distribution of HIV and AIDS strategic information solely electronically can have serious limitations.

3.5 Forms and content of information

Information received

General educational material on prevention, living positively and treatment literacy is received most often. Information on the social and economic impact of the epidemic and human-interest stories, case studies and testimonies follow. Analysis, research, best practice, as well as programmatic information-sharing and information on funding sources is received less often.

Patterns of information received "often" or "never" vary considerably between countries. In view of this variation, countries do seem to have specific information needs. For example, the need for medical information, such as on vaccine development and treatment, seem to be more pronounced in Malawi and Mozambique than in other countries. Human-interest stories, case studies and testimonies seem to be more easily accessible in Zambia than in other countries. Given the balance of responses in Malawi, Swaziland and Zambia, it seems that information linking the organisation to other programmes and resources are particularly scarce, whereas Mozambique and Zimbabwe seem to have comparatively more of this type of information in circulation.

4. Information Needs

Most of the information gaps identified by organisations are very similar, indicating similar needs and priorities that should be taken into account by national, regional and international HIV and AIDS information service providers.

In response to a close-ended question, 70% of respondents mentioned the lack of details on country programmes as a failing; 68% pointed to a lack of information on accessing funding, and 68% mentioned evaluation research on programme impact and best practice as a gap. Fewer interviewees (60%) listed global information on the status and spread of the epidemic and risk factors, and global information on the social and economic impact of the epidemic (57%).

The close-ended question was supplemented with an open-ended question about organisations' information needs. A number of areas in which more information needs to be made available were identified:

- Information on treatment is very important. Treatment literacy is a great challenge that needs to be addressed, and information plays a key role. It is not good to distribute ARVs without proper information on how to use them, their side effects, access to support, where to access the drugs, etc.
- More children's voices should be included in the information produced. Information should be targeted at children so that they can relate to it and understand it.
- More information on treatment for children.
- Child counselling material needs to be made available.
- Information should be specifically targeted at schools.
- Not enough voices of women, black people and youth are heard.
- Gender-sensitive information is needed.
- More information targeting the youth is needed.
- Information about mental disability and HIV and AIDS is needed.
- Information about rape/sexual abuse and HIV and AIDS.
- More information on sources for funding HIV and AIDS programmes.
- More information on the links between poverty and HIV and AIDS.
- More information on the economic and social impact of the epidemic in society and country as a whole.
- More information on traditional therapies.
- More information on workplace practices.

"The materials rather must be developed according to the cultural values of a particular community, and not globally written."

- More information on female condoms.
- More information on life skills/ personal empowerment.
- More information on mother-to-child transmission
- Information about specific programmes, workshops, activities in each country should be provided.
- Testimonials and voices from HIV and AIDS-infected people should be much more prominent.
- Cater for the information needs of blind and deaf people. Make information available in Braille.

4.1 Information needs – strategic versus educational

Distinguishing the information needs identified by the organisations in terms of Strategic Information and IEC Information reveals fundamental differences in terms of the content and form of information, and training and capacity building.

Strategic Information Needs

In all five countries organisations specifically requested:

- More information on programmes and activities
- Case studies
- Reference material
- (Academic) Research
- Statistics
- Epidemic updates and country reports
- Information on campaigns and global events
- Sources of funding and proposal writing
- Trends in training
- Paediatric treatment
- STIs
- Microbicides
- Development and economic empowerment
- Religious views

"HIV and AIDS information is part of our core duties for HIV and AIDS mitigation with orphans so we seek information relating to childcare as well as all types of HIV and AIDS information."

Interpreting/understanding statistics and epidemiological data

Crucially, many organisations expressed difficulty in understanding and interpreting HIV and AIDS statistics. ASOs and PLWHA organisations felt it was important to present statistical and epidemiological data in a more user-friendly and accessible way, so that workers on the ground can use the information meaningfully. Respondents expressed concern over conflicting statistics i.e. from government and civil society. They said it is difficult to gauge the reliability of the information and creates confusion. Organisations expressed the need to train workers in the basic skills required for interpreting epidemiological information.

IEC Information Needs

On the whole, many aspects of both the form and content of IEC information were evaluated positively. However, some very important issues were identified as needs that should be addressed, as the chart below demonstrates.

Some aspects of the negative side of the evaluation are not equally felt in all countries: 38% of organisations in Mozambique and 49% in Swaziland rated HIV and AIDS material poorly in terms of cultural appropriateness; but nobody in Malawi, 2% of organisations in Zambia and 3% in Zimbabwe shared this view. Organisations evaluated HIV and AIDS material more positively especially in Malawi, but to some extent also in Zambia, than in other countries.

- The need for local and country-specific HIV and AIDS information: Most respondents pointed to the lack of local and country-specific HIV and AIDS information. Interviewees felt strongly that more relevant local information should be produced and distributed; grassroots voices were regarded as more credible and effective. They also felt that issues experienced by community members should be highlighted, with the information needs of organisations providing local-level services better addressed.
- Rural Urban information divide: There is concern about the lack of access to HIV and AIDS information in rural communities, with coverage of the impact of the pandemic in the countryside also seen as problematic. Respondents felt it was imperative to work towards equitable programmes that address

information needs in rural districts, with resources made available by government and donor agencies.

- **Reflect the voices of people infected with HIV and AIDS:** Many organisations expressed concern that the information being disseminated does not include enough voices of people living with HIV and AIDS.
- **Community Participation:** Organisations identified a need to consult communities to determine their information priorities and involve them in testing materials to ensure comprehension, suitability and relevance. Community members should also be trained to conduct participatory research to inform the production of IEC materials.

"People who produce should involve the target audience in the production of materials...What gets reported in terms of programming is idealistic, as compared to the real situation."

- HIV and AIDS Messages: Messages should be consistent; messages are often ambivalent and create confusion in the target population. The need to develop positive messages rather than negative ones that increase stigmatisation and discrimination was emphasised. Organisations working on the ground should be involved in the process of developing IEC materials.
- The need to repackage and adapt the HIV and AIDS information received: Many organisations felt the information received could not be disseminated to target audiences in its current form because: it was in English and needed translation; it was too technical and difficult to understand; it was not culturally appropriate or locally relevant. Hence, organisations very often need to adapt the information received.

Primary reasons for repackaging and adapting information:

<u>Language</u>

Language was repeatedly mentioned as one of the most important reasons for adapting information. Most of the information available is in English, which needs to be

translated into local languages for better comprehension. There is some variation between the countries; for instance, almost all organisations in Malawi and Mozambique reported that they adapted HIV and AIDS information into local languages, while Zambian organisations are more likely to disseminate HIV and AIDS information in English.

<u>Literacy</u>

Literacy is a major constraint to information access for many people in the region. Alternative ways of communicating information should be explored to cater for the needs of illiterate people. Posters, illustrations, audiovisual materials, and performing arts were all mentioned as key media that should be used.

Appropriateness, suitability and relevance

Information has to be adapted to make it more accessible, appropriate and relevant to target audiences: At present it is often not relevant to existing cultural practices (HIV and AIDS information should be packaged in the context of conservative norms and values in society); it is too technical and academic and needs to be demystified and simplified. Information has to be modified to make it relevant to specific groups such as women, children and youth. Respondents recommended making available more print material to distribute in areas where there is no access to ICTs; the use of DVDs, tape recordings and videos was emphasised.

"As a media organisation, we appreciate wellwritten and packaged stories with pictures that we can use `as is.""

An important constraint to adapting information is the **lack of capacity and skills in organisations**. As a result, HIV and AIDS information is often distributed unedited to target groups, who then find it difficult to relate to the information. Respondents felt strongly that there is a need for more production and distribution of relevant and simple print media materials in the appropriate languages targeting specific groups as well as the general public.

5. Improvements to the flow of HIV and AIDS information

The following issues of concern were identified by the survey across all sample countries:

• **Organisational access to HIV and AIDS electronic information:** HIV and AIDS information is not reaching everybody in an equitable manner, with organisations working in rural areas particularly disadvantaged. ICTs are effective and efficient in distributing HIV and AIDS information, but it is

important to be aware of the limitations. Access to computers, internet and email is limited in rural areas. Besides access to ICTs, there is the real constraint of the lack of capacity/skills to use the medium. Even where ICTs are available, many people struggle to use electronic communications effectively. Respondents prioritised the need to train and build the capacity of individuals and organisations to use the technology.

- Managing information at country level: Respondents felt it was crucial that HIV and AIDS information be properly managed and distributed at country level. Local/country information on the epidemic should be prioritised, with HIV and AIDS information mainstreamed into all sectors of society. Information should be consolidated and distributed broadly in the country.
- The role of HIV and AIDS organisations, NACs and Governments: Most respondents felt it was the responsibility of all organisations working in the field of HIV and AIDS to play an important role in distributing information to other organisations and in communities. Many also felt that governments and national AIDS councils in each country should play a more proactive role in facilitating and coordinating the dissemination of information to HIV and AIDS organisations and to the public in general.

Information providers should use existing community structures to distribute information, including post offices, public libraries, organisations working on the ground, resource centers, churches, business, door-to-door distribution. Lack of transport is an important constraint to distributing information but the use of mobile multimedia units to distribute information and materials could help reach isolated rural communities.

 Networking, partnerships: Government, ASOs and PLWHA organisations should network and share information about their work and the specific HIV and AIDS information needs of their target audiences. Government and national HIV and AIDS umbrella bodies should coordinate the exchange and dissemination of information. Information is often duplicated on most of the email list, servers/sites. A distribution plan should be developed to address this problem. Debates on issues concerning information and service delivery between

Debates on issues concerning information and service delivery between organisations working on the ground should be promoted.

Strategies should be developed and implemented to make sure that information reaches the organisations and people that need it in a timely and updated manner. Religious organisations should be actively involved in distributing information.

• **Central distribution body for HIV and AIDS information:** Many respondents felt that a way to respond to the above gaps and needs in information flow would be to establish a central national distribution body

responsible for coordinating and distributing HIV and AIDS information and materials. Such a body should develop a coordinated, systematic national strategy to distribute HIV and AIDS information. There was also a need to establish resource centres or identify central distribution points at national, provincial, district and community levels to make information available to organisations and community residents.

- Database of HIV and AIDS organisations working on the ground: Respondents felt it important to develop databases of HIV and AIDS information sources in their countries and the region, as well as databases of all organisations working on the ground. This would help improve partnerships and communication, and information sharing between organisations, and ultimately influence the quality of services provided.
- Monitoring and evaluation of the information: Organisations need to critically evaluate the information received before distributing it to target audiences. There should be ongoing monitoring and evaluation of information and materials produced and distributed, perhaps by the proposed central body, which should have the necessary capacity and skills to implement the process.
- Media workers/Journalists: Some respondents indicated the importance of targeting journalists and media houses in distributing HIV and AIDS information. They felt the media should be more involved in reporting on HIV and AIDS issues in their countries; reporters should be stationed in communities to report on the epidemic; newspapers should regularly distribute information on HIV and AIDS; reporting by journalists should be improved in terms of quality, relevance and sensitivity.
- **Financial resources:** Access to financial resources for distributing information is a major constraint. Organisations experience problems in reproducing the information received because of the costs involved in the process i.e. photocopying and posting costs. As a result, they struggle to distribute HIV and AIDS information to their beneficiaries.

Donors should prioritise and support the ICT needs of organisations to access information, and the need to develop and produce appropriate information materials relevant to the people in each country.

6. Key Recommendations

Strategic Information

- Statistical and epidemiological data needs to be made available in a more userfriendly and accessible way, so that workers on the ground can more effectively use it.
- Information providers should make an effort to research and report thoroughly on HIV and AIDS issues specific to each country, such as programmes and "best practices". This would ensure more up-to-date knowledge about the status of the epidemic and other related information.

IEC

- Increasing local and country-specific HIV and AIDS information production and distribution is crucial.
- HIV and AIDS information providers in the region should produce and package information in local languages for specific countries.
- Information providers should address the specific information needs of organisations producing and packaging HIV and AIDS information, so that it is relevant to their target audiences.
- HIV and AIDS organisations should be encouraged to produce in-house materials on HIV and AIDS to increase relevance, suitability and comprehension for internal use and for distribution in their respective countries.
- PLWHA should be more involved in designing HIV and AIDS material and channelling information to ensure that the information produced and distributed reflects the real voices of PLWHA, and shows the human face of the epidemic.
- Information providers should develop and distribute relevant and user-friendly IEC materials specifically for women and youth, the primary target audiences.
- Children should be targeted more by information service providers and organisations working on the ground. Appropriate and relevant information should be produced and distributed to address the needs of the child.
- More IEC information must reach rural communities.

Capacity Strengthening

- ICT training should be prioritised by donor agencies and organisations to ensure that people gain the necessary skills in operating and accessing electronic information by computer.
- Workers should be trained in the skills needed to read and interpret basic epidemiological information.
- The technical capacity of staff must be improved so as to develop their abilities to adapt and translate materials correctly.

• Staff must be persuaded to develop a reading culture, and a culture of using the internet, so that they can explore all avenues to expand their knowledge base.

Information Flows and Management

- It is imperative for stakeholders to network more extensively and involve targeted communities in HIV and AIDS activities.
- The media and channels used for information dissemination must be diverse and consider the demand for electronic media as well as print material requested by communities and organisations.
- Electronic media (such as CDs, videos, audio tapes, etc) should be distributed more widely. Multimedia packs, for instance, should be developed and forwarded to key stakeholders in the country, utilising, for example, the postal service where appropriate.
- Better co-ordination in distributing HIV and AIDS information in countries is necessary.
- A central distribution body responsible for receiving and distributing HIV and AIDS information nationally to all organisations and individuals concerned should be established.
- Databases of HIV and AIDS information providers as well as databases of organisations working in the field need to be made available.
- HIV and AIDS information providers should conduct aggressive marketing campaigns in the region and in each country, to make organisations and individuals aware of their existence.

7. About PlusNews
